

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ

"For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace."

These words from Isaiah 9:6 were written many centuries before the birth of Jesus, in prophecy of his coming.

The message of peace that Jesus brings is both timeless and very timely, given current instability and conflicts around the world. As I write, the situations in Ukraine and Russia, and in Israel, Palestine and Lebanon, remain unresolved. The cycle of death and destruction is utterly contrary to Jesus' call for "life in all its fullness" (John 10:10).

The birth of Jesus took place in a land which was riven with instability. The murderous commands of King Herod, the vassal king under the Roman occupation, contrast acutely with the message that Christ came into the world to proclaim. Jesus himself experienced refugee status, being taken by Mary and Joseph to safety in Egypt, prior to the death

of Herod, before it was safe to travel back to Nazareth. The gold given by the Magi must have been vital in sustaining Jesus, Mary and Joseph during those years in Egypt, away from the income generated in the carpenter's shop in Nazareth.

More than two thousand years on, the world is still not free of such hatred – but the love of God, revealed in Jesus Christ, proclaims a different and better way. I pray that this will guide and challenge thinking in 2025.

You are welcome to come to the Services during Christmas and Advent at Colinton and at Juniper Green and Service times are listed on page five.

THE FIVE MARKS OF MISSION

In 2020, the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland endorsed the Five Marks of Mission, agreeing that for the Church to be fit for purpose in the 21st century, these five marks must be evidenced at local, regional and national levels. The Five Marks of Mission will be also used by the Presbytery in reviewing the ministry and the life of every congregation every five years. The Five Marks of Mission are:

- 1. To proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom
- 2. To teach, baptise and nurture new believers
- 3. To respond to human need by loving service
- 4. To transform unjust structures of society, to challenge violence of every kind and pursue peace and reconciliation
- 5. To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation, and sustain and renew the life of the earth

Where can we, as a congregation and as individuals, contribute to developing these aims? In looking ahead - and in conjunction with a new



Minister - Edinburgh Pentlands Parish Church (and all congregations of the Church of Scotland) will need to engage with, and seek to promote, all five.

Have a close look at the new logo of Edinburgh Pentlands Parish Church (above). In addition to the Cross at the centre and a representation of the Pentland Hills in dark blue, there are five bright colours in the arc of the new logo. These five colours are linked to the **Five Marks of Mission**. May they inspire us in our Christian witness, outreach and service.

FROM THE SESSION CLERK

Some points of interest from the Edinburgh Pentlands Parish Kirk Session meetings in October and November

Electoral Roll

Prior to the election of the Nominating Committee to seek a new Minister, we need to finalise the Electoral Roll. This will comprise all those previously on the Colinton Roll, the Colinton Adherents Roll, the Juniper Green Roll, the Juniper Green Adherents Roll and the Juniper Green Supplementary Roll, together with any regular worshippers who complete applications to be added to the Adherents Roll as a result of the edicts read in Church on 3rd, 10th and 17th November. At the time of writing, four people have been added as adherents and three more applications are in process.

Vote on departure from the Church's practice in relation to human sexuality in respect of the current vacancy

As part of the preparation for the election of the Nominating Committee, the Kirk Session voted on whether or not to depart from the Church's practice in relation to human sexuality in respect of the current vacancy. The Kirk Session voted in favour of this, which means that applications for the current vacancy can be considered from, amongst others, individuals who are in a same sex civil partnership or a same sex marriage.

Parish Profile

A subgroup from the Kirk Session is now actively preparing the Parish Profile in support of the vacancy. This will be considered in detail at the Kirk Session meeting on 10th December at which at least one Vacancy Advisory Committee member is expected to attend. Completion and agreement of the Parish Profile is required before a date can be finalised for the election of the Nominating Committee.

Election of Nominating Committee

The election of the Nominating Committee will be intimated by edict at Church Services on the two Sundays prior to the election. The election will take place no earlier than Sunday 26th January, but looks more likely to be in February or March.



The Colinton Dell path

I attended a meeting, with representatives from some Colinton organisations and the local Council, to discuss what was to be done to enable the path through Colinton Dell to the north of Colinton Church to be re-opened. I'm pleased to say it is now open.

Planning Application for additional car parking at Colinton Church

Our application for additional car parking spaces in the grounds between Colinton Church and the Manse has been submitted and is currently being considered by the Council.

Website Progress

A new website for Edinburgh Pentlands Parish Church is still under construction. We hope it will be completed by end of 2024.

Purchase of a new Manse

The Kirk Session has authorised the group looking for a new Manse, to bid for one more suitable for a modern Minister.

Christmas Arrangements

The Kirk Session has approved various arrangements taking place around Christmas, including:

- Christmas Fair at Juniper Green on Saturday 7th December
- Carol Service at Colinton at 6:30pm on Sunday 15th December
- Christmas Eve Services at both Colinton and Juniper Green at 6:30pm on Tuesday 24th December. These services will be familyoriented
- Watchnight Service at Colinton at 11:30pm, Tuesday 24th December
- Christmas Day Service at Juniper Green at 11:15am

Administrative Assistant

In view of the increased workload resulting from our Union, the Kirk Session has approved the recruitment of a part-time Administrative Assistant to assist Lindsey Rowlands in the Church Office.

Inclusion Policy

At the November Kirk Session meeting the following Inclusion Policy was approved:

So in Christ Jesus you are all children of God through faith, for all of you who were baptised into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ. There is neither Jew nor Gentile, neither slave nor free, nor is there male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus.

(Galatians 3:26-28)

DREGHORN MAUSOLEUM


Recently, I became interested in finding out more about the burial mausoleum in Colinton Church graveyard, which was apparently created for the owners of Dreghorn Castle.

The remaining fragment of the south gable, now visible though the north window of the foyer in Colinton Church, with the copper plaque above two carved stone panels, indicates stylistically the building to be late 17th or early 18th century in origin. This is therefore the oldest part of the building at Colinton Church still visible. I decided to investigate this special mausoleum in greater detail.

It had obviously been a gable-roofed structure, which is now half buried by changes in the ground levels. The building's origin was detected from finding on one of the quoins (corner stones), close to ground level, an 'M' carved into the stone. The conclusion is that this indicates the probable builder to be Sir William Murray, Master of Works to King Charles II, and builder of Dreghorn Castle, circa 1671.



The lands of Dreghorn Castle belonged to Sir James Foulis of Colinton and they passed, by marriage of his daughter, to Sir William. On the upper part of the carved stone panels on the mausoleum there is an oval, surrounded by elaborate plumage and supported by two putti. The oval centre panel has an elaborate monogram which could be interpreted as 'WM' for William Murray.

David Pitcairn, Writer to the Signet, followed Sir William Murray as owner of Dreghorn Castle before 1690, when he was admitted to Colinton Kirk Session. He was descended from the Pitcairns of Pitcairn, whose ancestral lands were near Leslie in Fife. He was described as an active Elder and was also a heritor as owner of Dreghorn Castle.

David Pitcairn was married to Mary Anderson, the daughter of a Minister who strongly opposed the episcopacy during the reign of Charles II. On Pitcairn's death in 1709, the Dreghorn Estate was inherited by his eldest son, Patrick, who then sold it in 1715. The lower of the two carved panels on the mausoleum contain the arms of the Pitcairn family.

The heraldic description is "ARMS: Argent, three Lozenges Gules. CHREST: A moon in her compliment Proper. MOTTO: Plena refulget (the full moon shines)". The stonework of the panel is eroded, but enough survives to identify the main elements.



Beneath this is a panel surround, part of which is buried below ground level, and similar to the surround of the arms panel, which probably once contained the inscription:

"Here lies Mr. David Pitcairn of Dreghorn, who departed this

life 27th January 1709, and of his age the 60 years, leaving Mary Anderson his wife, with five sons and seven daughters by her".

Also no longer visible are the emblems carved in bold relief, said to have flanked this panel... on the left a winged hourglass with scroll and, on the right, a skull, crossbones and scroll.

The copper plaque above the stone panels commemorates the restoration of the building in 1864, under the supervision of Thomas Murray LLD, a local resident. He had an interest in the descendants of David Pitcairn and what led them to fund the necessary works.

The six named persons, from aristocratic families of Scotland,

were all descended from Rev. William Robertson DD, principal of Edinburgh University and grandson of David Pitcairn. It is impossible to say what work was carried out in 1864, or any subsequent alterations, to accommodate the 1908 church building.

The north gable of the historic mausoleum has been completely rebuilt to include panels which commemorate Robert Andrew MacFie (1811-1893), the last private owner of Dreghorn Castle, and his family. Robert MacFie bought the estate in 1864, when he stepped back from the family sugar refining firm of Macfie & Sons, which became part of Tate & Lyle.

He is recorded as obtaining Matriculated Arms, as noted in the Lord Lyon register in 1864. A panel with these Arms is built into the far side of the gable.

Robert MacFie and his wife Caroline are not buried in the Colinton Churchyard but in a family plot at South Leith Churchyard (pictured below).

We are looking forward to seeing you there.



COLINTON LOCAL HISTORY SOCIETY

Now that winter is here. our 2024/2025 season of meetings is well underway and what a great line-up Liz Windle, our Speakers Secretary, has organised for us.

Our first four meetings were all very well attended. They started on 7th October with a fascinating talk by Bruce Keith entitled Scotland Beneath the Surface, covering details of both man-made and natural underground chambers and tunnels, which lie beneath our country. Items in the talk ranged from the 15 million gallon reservoir at Alnwickhill, the wonderful under-croft beneath the ruins of Yester Castle at Gifford, to the two gigantic oil storage 'tanks' hewn out of the rock in the north of Scotland, which were used to supply the naval ships and convoys during the wars. They were brought back into use at the time of the Falkland War!


This was followed on 21st October with a presentation about the History of Morningside, 1800 - 1930, by Bob Cunningham. Then on 4th November, Barclay Price told us about The Beneficiaries of the Freedom of Edinburgh.

Among some of his interesting stories was that, in the 1600s, Edinburgh had bestowed the Honour on the man who brought the first rhubarb seeds to Scotland from Russia. Also, although well-known comedian Sir Harry Lauder (pictured on the right) had received the Honour, the Council elected *not* to bestow the Freedom on (at that time) Prince Charles, the Prince of Wales, much to the embarrassment of our City Fathers!

On 18th November, David Farries talked about the Legacy of James Braidwood, Founder of the Scottish Fire Brigade and our last talk in 2024, held on 2nd December, Robert Braid, Photographer, was presented by Bruce Jamieson.

And finally, as a result of our last article which appeared in this magazine, I am delighted to say that we have received a few photos and items from local residents for safekeeping in our archives, so... Many Thanks... and don't
