Dear Sisters and Brothers

in Christ. In December 2002, I visited Jerusalem as part of a three-person delegation on behalf of the Church of Scotland's former Board of Practice and Procedure. We were looking at the future of the Church of Scotland's work in Israel and Palestine, including the consequences of any legal changes. Not exactly the conventional stuff of pilgrimage.

Most of the time was spent in meetings, notably with lawyers and church officials. Nevertheless, it was important to get a sense of context rather than just legal facts. This resulted in a visit that I will never forget: driving down the Jordan Valley Road through the Palestinian West Bank, talking to local people, seeing Jaffa, Tel Aviv, Tiberias, Jericho, Nazareth and Jerusalem, aware of the sense of tension - and being unable to visit Bethlehem due to an Israeli military checkpoint, yet seeing Bethlehem in the distance, several miles away.

It was a time of considerable tension in Israel and Palestine, although nothing nearly as awful as the events of recent months. As I write, the ceasefire in Gaza has broken down, resulting in yet more deaths and destruction. I pray that a ceasefire will have been re-established by the time you read this – please pray for justice and peace.

enjoy reading all the articles from our many contributors.

During my visit, a particular highlight was the chance to visit both the Church of the Holy Sepulchre in Jerusalem, supposedly built on the site of Jesus' crucifixion at Golgotha and his three-day tomb. Normally, it would have been thronged with pilgrims, yet due to the dangerous situation at the time, it was almost deserted. Seeing the empty tomb reminded me of words from Luke 24:6-8:

He is not here; he has risen!
Remember how he told you,
while he was still with you in
Galilee: 'The Son of Man must
be delivered over to the hands of
sinners, be crucified and on the
third day be raised again.' Then
they remembered his words.

The administration of the Church of the Holy Sepulchre was agreed through a 'Status Quo' of 1757, where several different Christian communities were given responsibility and control over different areas of the building. It's far from satisfactory and, sometimes, there are heated disagreements. Yet perhaps this

reflects human weakness – trying to live out Jesus' prayer, as in John 17:21: *that all may be one* is far from easy. My fifteen years of work in ecumenical bodies at Scottish, European and global levels often taxed any diplomatic skills to the limit.

Two thousand years ago, the Roman occupation impacted on Jerusalem. Today, we also see global political tensions impacting on Jerusalem and indeed elsewhere – including here. Then and now, into such a chaotic world, comes the person of Jesus Christ, with his divine message of peace, love, truth, justice, reconciliation and hope. The message of Easter is of the

centrality of resurrection. The way of Christ overcomes even death on a cross. The Easter message is a joyous one, giving us hope - Christ is with us. Our call is to be on the side of hope, not the side of chaos and turmoil, even if the current situation in Israel and Palestine seems so forlorn.

The Church is called by Christ to be salt and light – witnessing Christ's love in the community. Here at Edinburgh Pentlands Parish Church, we look forward with hope. A Nominating Committee has now been elected to engage in the selection process which will result in a call to a new Minister. Please pray for the work of the Nominating Committee and for the new Minister, whoever he or she may be. This work of witnessing Christ's love must continue – there's much to be done.

Our confidence and hope come from the good news of Christ's resurrection. I wish you a happy and blessed Easter.

Messy Treasure Hunt


Saturday 10th May

BEHOLD THE MAN EDINBURGH EASTER PLAY 2025

You may remember a feature about the Edinburgh Easter Play which appeared in the first issue of *The Parish Publication*. This is a drama that tells the Easter Story and takes place every year in Princes Street Gardens, Edinburgh. I went to see it last year and found it moving and powerful, so I encourage you to go along if it's something that appeals to you.

Every year, there is a different script. Last year, it told the story from the perspective of eleven women.

This year it will explore how Jesus defied people's expectations of a man.

The play integrates British Sign Language (BSL), which means that there are BSL interpreters who move round the stage in costume, as part of the cast.

Property Works



We have received permission to remove two pews from the front right of Colinton Church, to facilitate the creation of a children's area, similar to the area in Juniper Green Church.

Based in Edinburgh, **Love From Jamie** is run by us, Martin and Fiona, Jamie's parents, and we are both members of the congregation. We work hard to fundraise, in order to provide financial support to families when they need it most. So far, we have been able to support a number of families to cover the costs of headstones and memorials, to allow them to mark the lives of their children. We also support families in financial difficulty, often due to having to take unpaid leave following a child's death

We decided to set up **Love From Jamie** in our son's name to help other families who find themselves in a situation like ours. Whilst we cannot take away the pain families go through, we aim to ease some of the financial pressure that comes with taking time off work, the expense of counselling appointments or additional funeral costs.



The charity is solely funded through fundraising from events we have organised ourselves, participating in events as an affiliated charity and from people who have chosen to fundraise on our behalf through a number of different ways, such as sporting events, challenges at work or school and also memorial collections.

This year, Martin will take on his first half-marathon to raise money for **Love From Jamie** and we will also be holding a number of fundraising events which we would love members of the congregation to get involved in! 



INCLEMENT WEATHER BACK THEN...

My awareness of poverty levels was very clear during my primary school years. For example, many children had less than adequate shoes and I remember one boy, Jimmy, coming to school wearing a pair of his mother's wedge-heeled shoes.

Obviously, they were all he had to wear. Jimmy was a tough youngster and, although not a bully, no boy laughed at him or teased him.

When it rained heavily or snowed, we were often given a half-day off school as many kids had no boots or wellies and there was even a lack of decent coats. The clothing authorities observed that there was a large amount of left-over leather from army boot manufacturers, air force flying jackets and pilots' helmets. Very soon, we were all going to school with wee leather helmets and tackett-studded boots. On dark mornings, the latter allowed us to kick sparks off the pavement, but our parents soon realised what was wearing out the soles of the boots and we were suitably dealt with.

Our local park was a winter paradise and, armed with home-made wooden sledges and inadequate shoes and gloves, we played until nearly frozen. I can still remember crying at the pain of thawing out my hands and feet.

Having been involved in the past with oil and energy industries, I worry about the general lack of real concern regarding future sources of heat. In 1947, I can remember we had below-freezing temperatures for weeks, with no coal, low gas pressure and cuts to electricity. We went to bed early with layers of clothes on to keep warm and food was in short supply. Some politicians today do not realise what can happen and surely, it might happen again.

Attending Parsons Green School as a boy also holds many memories for me – one of the most vivid being the weekly gas mask drill. One boy found, that by covering



the filter and blowing really hard, he could make an impressive, slightly rude, sound. Not to be outdone, the rest of us tried to see if we could be even more impressive – but were in danger of dying of laughter, rather than of gas!

In due course, slates and chalk gave way to paper and pencils, then we had fountain pens, followed by free milk and orange juice. We had survived

primary school and the war, so now we were ready for the next stage in our lives – long trousers, 11-plus exams and Secondary school. Great!
